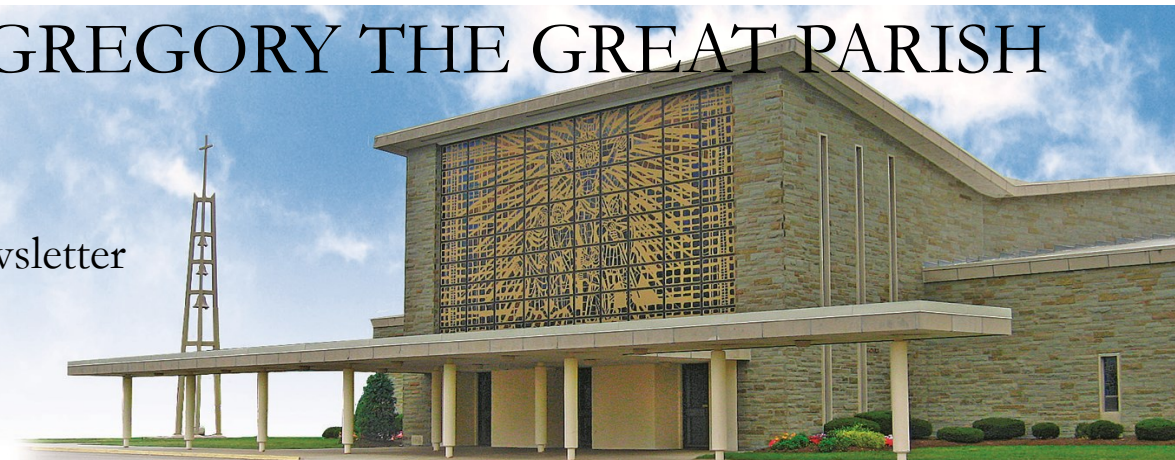

Doktor Family Aims to Carry out God's Work as Missionaries

Matthew and Kelly Doktor are St. Greg's Parishioners with three wonderful daughters, the oldest two of whom attend St. Greg's School. Matthew has worked for IBM for 20 years, and Kelly is a stay-at-home mom who is active in parish ministries, as well as sharing a love of Christian music with her husband.

While it might sound like they have everything they need, a few years ago the couple began to feel something was missing from their lives, and they both felt a deeper call to a greater ministry.

Then, through a chance meeting, Kelly heard about the Family Mission Company, an organization that helps to place individuals and families in locations around the world where missionaries are sorely needed.

It wasn't long before the whole family participated in a 'Come and See' session which explained how the whole process works, and what the family could expect as missionaries in a foreign country.

The Doktors loved what they saw at that session, even though it would call for a drastic departure from their current lifestyle. Missionary work abroad involves a very poor existence, with an emphasis on community and sharing, praise and worship, Scripture study, projects of public works, and of course, time in ministry.

All members of the family became convinced that full-time ministry abroad was their calling, so they inquired about it with the Family Mission Company. In September of 2019, the entire family will undergo the 'Intake' process, which is a type of formation training that prepares individuals for life as missionaries.

Since there was a considerable wait involved before September, the family kept the missionary flames burning by taking on a week-long trip to General Cepeda, Mexico, during Thanksgiving of 2018.

In that week, they got a good flavor for the missionary experience, participating in service projects, traveling to small villages for talks and community worship, and ministering to the poor and the sick. This week of exposure to the process convinced them that they had made the right choice.

The family members saw joy in the faces of villagers to whom they delivered food or clothing, or helped with housing repairs. Clearly, God's hand was at work in these villages, and that was what appealed so strongly to the Doktor family.



At the end of that week, everyone in the family knew that missionary work was their calling, and that they couldn't wait to begin God's work wherever they happened to be placed.

This doesn't mean that the Doktors can sit around and wait for September to come, as there is much to be done prior to the Intake program. All the family possessions must be sold, including their house, so that nothing is left behind which would require any caretaking.

The family has no idea how long they will actually be on this mission or where they will go in the world to spread God's word, and they don't know what they will do when they return to the U.S.

As you might guess, all this causes some considerable anxiety, but as Matthew Doktor says, all that is offset by other considerations. "We are so incredibly excited to see how His plan unfolds for us, our mission partners, and those we serve."

Spirit and Life speaks with Daniel Victoor

You recently announced that you will be resigning your position as Parish Director of Music Ministry on August 1. What are your plans?

I have been here for 18 years. In August I will pursue an instruction program that will get me a New York State Commercial Drivers' License. Then I hope to be employed as an "over the road" truck driver. This means I will visit my family in Western Canada more often than now. I'm also looking forward to seeing a lot more of the U.S. and Canada.

Where were you before you came to St. Gregory's?

I grew up on a dairy and grain farm near Edmonton, Alberta. I moved to Montreal at age 26 to pursue a music degree at McGill University. Then I worked for a while on a part-time basis in Toronto and North Bay. This led to a full-time position in Ogdensburg, N.Y. as Music Director at the Cathedral of St. Mary and at Wadhams Hall Seminary College. One day I saw an ad in the Ogdensburg diocesan newspaper about an opening at St. Gregory the Great Church in Amherst. I came for an interview with Monsignor Wright and the Search Committee in late June 2001. And the rest, as they say, is history.

What final message would you like to give to our Parishioners?

Before I came to St. Greg's I had very little experience working with children. I learned that the childhood years are crucial in the formation of future Church musicians, and in fact for future leaders in our Church and our society. I



am grateful for the opportunity to have worked with so many children over the years and to have influenced them for the better.

I definitely enjoy living in Western New York. People here are very friendly, especially to Canadians. Buffalo really is the "City of Good Neighbors." I am also grateful to the three Pastors I worked with – Msgr. Wright, Father Gatto and Father Biernat – for their support and encouragement.

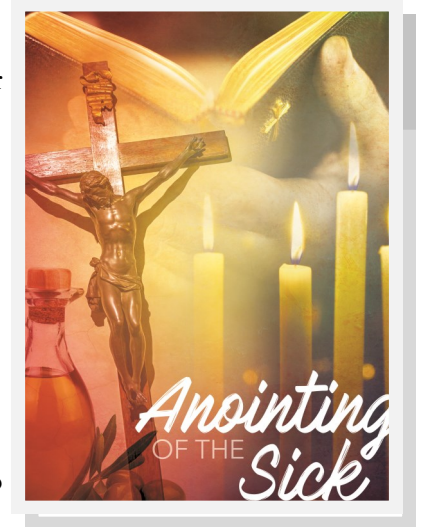


Celebrating the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

From the very earliest days of the Church, it has been the practice for priests to anoint sick people with holy oil. We read these words in the Epistle of James (5:14) “Is there anyone sick among you? Let him send for the presbyters of the Church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick man and the Lord will raise him up. If he has committed any sins, they will be forgiven him.”

Many of us can recall when this Sacrament was called “Extreme Unction”, a name which suggests a final anointing. That name does justice to what was often the actual practice, namely to wait until the last minute before summoning the priest. That name and that practice, however, do not fully express the reality of the Sacrament. It is a Sacrament for the sick, not just for those at death’s door.

The General Introduction for the Pastoral Care for the Sick, issued in the wake of the Second Vatican Council, makes this clear. It specifies that while intended for the seriously ill, the faithful “should not follow the wrongful practice of delaying the reception of the Sacrament”. The guidelines also specify that “the Sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after being anointed and then again falls ill, or if during the same illness the person’s condition becomes more serious. A sick person may be anointed before surgery whenever a serious illness is the reason for the surgery. Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present.”



At Saint Gregory’s, this Sacrament is celebrated regularly at the conclusion of the 5:30 p.m. Vigil Mass on the first Saturday of each month. The anointing ceremony usually involves ten or twenty sick persons, and often their families, and generally lasts fifteen minutes. This is an ideal way to celebrate the Sacrament, since it follows immediately the celebration of the Eucharist, and affords the sick an opportunity to pray not just for themselves, but also for one another. You do not need to notify the parish in advance if you plan to take part in this rite.

If you need to arrange an anointing for a relative or friend, at home or in the hospital, simply call the Parish Office at 688-5678 and give the information to the receptionist. We urge you to do so in a timely manner, since the priest often cannot respond immediately.

Special Needs Seating Available in New Pew Arrangements

The first and last rows of the two center sections in Church are designated as seating for people with special needs, such as wheelchairs or other supportive devices.

During Mass, the Eucharist will be brought directly to individuals seated in these rows. There is no need for them to get up and move to the Eucharistic Ministers.

The last rows of the two center sections have wider access, to facilitate the passage of Eucharistic Ministers in to those who require assistance. Most of these spots have a longer pew behind them, to make wheelchair access easier and less troublesome.

There are also some wheelchair-accessible pews along the front of the Church, near the statue of Mary, and addi-

tional seating located along the back part of the Church.

If you are someone who needs wheelchair access and you are not sure of where it’s located, be sure to ask any of the Ushers for assistance during Mass.

Help the Jamaican Mission Trip Team

The Jamaican Mission Trip team is working with Mustard Seed Communities (MSC) to collect money needed for the purchase of diapers, which are in short supply in Jamaica and other communities served by MSC. All sizes from infant to adult-sized diapers are needed, and will be gratefully appreciated.

MSC is a non-profit organization which has dedicated itself to providing care for the most vulnerable citizens of societies in Jamaica, Nicaragua, Zimbabwe, Malawi, and the Dominican Republic.

Most care programs focus on helping those who are disabled in some way, or who are children affected by HIV/AIDS.

Mustard Seed Communities has an ongoing arrangement with a company that will provide 60,000 diapers in return for a contribution of \$1,650, which reduces the cost of each diaper to mere pennies, and is by far the most cost-effective approach to providing them where needed.



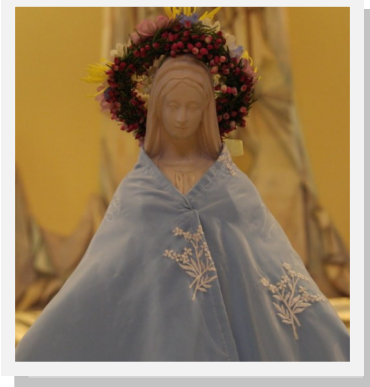

“Welcome Wagon” Visits Begin Next Month

In July, we begin the “Welcome Wagon” phase of our parish evangelization effort. In this phase, volunteers will call upon new residents in our Parish geographic area, welcoming them to the neighborhood and presenting them with a “Welcome Kit” that contains information about St. Greg’s Parish and School, a chit for free beverages for the family at the St. Greg’s Café., a book and/or CD about the Catholic Faith, from our Catholic Store and a few other goodies. Our hope is that some of the new residents will check out St. Gregory the Great Parish.

A few weeks ago, Father Thomas had an article in the Bulletin providing an update of the work of the Evangelization Committee. He referred to an imaginary conversation between Jesus and a St. Greg’s parishioner (let’s call him Greg):

Greg: “I want to remind You, Lord about my son in Denver and my daughter in Dallas. For some time now I have been asking you to lead them back to the regular practice of the Catholic faith they were raised in.”

Jesus: “I know of your deep concern for you children. I share that concern. In fact, no one, including you, is more concerned about your children than I. I have been working to get people in Denver and in Dallas involved in reaching out to people like your children and welcoming them to their church services. To date, I have not been as successful as I had hoped. Meantime, there is something I want to ask you.”

Greg: “Sure, Lord. I am open to what You might want to ask.”

Jesus: “Well, you see, Greg, I get prayers like yours every day. Right now, in fact, I have requests from people

in places like Denver and Dallas whose children have grown up and moved to places like Amherst. I need people in Amherst to reach out to people who could be new members of their parish families, people like you. Will you help?”

This imaginary dialogue ends with a question, and that is the question Jesus is asking the members of St. Gregory the Great Parish: “Will you help?”

We are not seeking more members for the Evangelization Committee. We have over a dozen members. We are not asking you to call on new Amherst residents. We have six volunteers who are preparing to do that.

The Committee is asking you now to help in two ways. First, make our parish outreach part of your personal prayer agenda. Ask God to make our efforts fruitful.

Second, sharpen your personal sense of hospitality. Imagine someone reaching out to your child in a distant city like Dallas or Denver. If your child ventured to attend church, you would hope and pray that he would be accepted, welcomed, affirmed. That is the way we want to treat newcomers to our parish liturgies. Ask yourself, “If I were a stranger attending St. Greg’s for the first time, what would I want to happen?”

Some ideas: Move in toward the center of your pew, leaving room for newcomers on the aisle. Smile and say “hello” to people you do not know. Make it a point, at the Sign of Peace, to greet at least one person who is unknown to you.

In these ways, we can say “Yes!” to our Lord’s request for help.

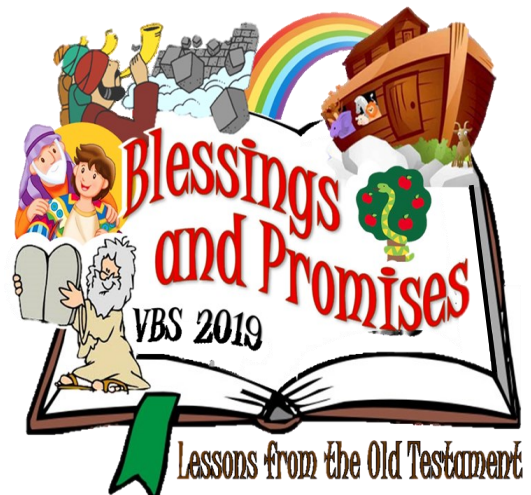


Vacation Bible School Dates are Set for Summer

The Question Box

Last month Father Thomas spoke at a school Mass and outlined a simple way for children to pray at night. I missed some of the details, and I've been wondering if this prayer method can be printed in the Bulletin or in an issue of Spirit and Life.

I am happy to oblige. Jesus said, "When you pray, go to your inner room, close the door and pray to your Father in secret" (Matthew 6). I suggest that kids do exactly that, and begin by making the Sign of the Cross. In doing this, you refer to three distinct Persons.

The first is God the Father, the giver of all good gifts, the one "from whom all blessings flow". Speak to the Father in your own words about the day that is ending. Use your ten fingers and see if you can recall ten things that happened today for which you are grateful. Thank God for each of these, in your own words.

Then think of God the Son, Jesus, "the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world". Review the day again, and this time, mention anything for which you wish to ask forgiveness from Jesus.

Finally, think of God the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the one who enables us to know what is right, and to do what is good. Think about tomorrow and the challenges and decisions you might have to deal with. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you know what is right, and to do what is right.
