

#### From the desk of the Pastor

My dear parish family,

This past Tuesday, I celebrated the 7:00 am daily Mass. I was thrilled to see one of our younger parishioners at Mass with his father. I learned that he wanted to come to Mass that day because it was his 13th birthday. What an awesome way to celebrate your Birthday and an awesome sign of spiritual life in our youth! That called me to take a step back and to reflect on how we grow up and what forces influence us. Obviously for this young man, his faith is a force forming him in life. What is forming you in your life?

On the other spectrum of life I have often wondered what factors came into play to make the "Greatest Generation" so great. For many years now I have celebrated funerals almost weekly for members of the "Greatest Generation." As I have celebrated these funerals I have had the privilege to meet with members of their families and learn about their lives. In the process I believe I have had the grace to learn some basic or simple truths about this generation. This past week I celebrated another "Greatest Generation" funeral for a person who was 98 years old. This funeral called me again to take that step back, and objectively observe what happened in her life and lifetime, and has reinforced my understanding of the "Greatest Generation."

I believe this "Greatest Generation" was ultimately formed by their situation in life. They were shaped first of all by the Great Depression. The majority grew up in poverty and, as I have heard over and over again, they were poor but didn't realize it because everyone was poor. The poverty of the depression influenced this Greatest Generation to appreciate what little they had and to be creative to entertain themselves with "homemade" games and imaginative ways to play. Their poverty shaped them to be great thinkers and gave them a working spirit to assess what needed to be done, along with a drive to simply do it. By and large they did not look for anyone to blame for their situation in life, nor did they look for some outside source to provide the material means they needed to live. (Continued on Page 2)

The financial and material poverty of the moment formed them to be the great savers, and hard workers and community oriented individuals, as people were literally forced to spend time socializing with one another as it was the only real option other than sitting completely alone with little to do.

Next they were shaped by World War II. This "Greatest Generation" was able to unite with a common purpose and again do what needed to be done. I learned a great deal from my father who served for four and a half years in the Army during World War II. Virtually everyone's personal lives were put on hold in order to either go and serve in the military or to stay home and work and produce what needed to be manufactured for the success of our wartime efforts. I have met many "Rosie the Riveters" along the way as well as war heroes like my dad. These individuals emerged from the War to build new homes, businesses, churches and many civic organizations as they returned to live what appeared to be normal family lives. They were formed by what happened during World War II.

This "Greatest Generation" also was by and large formed by their faith in God. As a generation they had maybe a simple faith, but a real and genuine faith and trust in God. They accepted the teachings of our Church as the "Rule of Life" and not as a "Rule of Life." Regardless of religious tradition, the Scripture and Gospel values were imbedded in their mind, heart and soul to form the way they thought, acted and basically lived. They were formed by their faith in God and the truths of the Catechism of the Church. We may joke about the old Baltimore Cate**chism** days, but in the end this generation was formed by it and they truly knew their theology and could answer virtually any question of faith. They were formed by these truths.

What has formed you? I often take a step back and reflect on this question, both personally as to what has formed me, and generationally what has formed and what does form a generation. As a pastor I sit in a unique position to see many generations and to observe what is important to them, what they truly value and how they make decisions. Almost weekly I have had insight into real lived experiences of the "Greatest Generation" and I also weekly have insight into my own generation and the ones that follow me. Today, as much as we are still formed by different experiences and "truths," we are not being formed as a generation in the same way as was the "Greatest Generation."

The basic elements of poverty (or simplicity of life), seeing what needs to be done for the common good and doing it, along with faith as a foundation, seem to be replaced by a desire for personal wealth and extravagance, a focus on self (the I-phone and selfies are well named), and differing philosophical ways of life apart from the unity of the Scripture and faith in God has led to a different way of life.

I will not share my assessment with you today, but simply ask you one question to reflect upon this week. What has formed you? Has your faith formed you as a universal truth to be lived, or do you desire to form your Church and your faith in God, which by other "truths?"

May God bless you, our Mother Mary watch over you and St. Gregory the Great intercede for you, always.


