

Learning about our New Priest - Fr. Moses Ikuelogbon

When did you arrive in the United States and what is the best thing you have discovered in Buffalo so far?

"I arrived September 22, 2013 and spent my first three weeks in a program in Washington, D.C. Then I came to Buffalo and joined the Diocese of Buffalo in 2014. My favorite discoveries in Buffalo so far consist of Buffalo wings, the Maid of the Mist at Niagara Falls, and the various restaurants in Buffalo."

What were the factors that led you to pursue the priesthood in Buffalo?

"There are a lot of priests in the western part of Nigeria, where I come from. A parish like St. Gregory's would have at least six priests there. When I was in my second year of theology back home, we were enrolled in a course known as Missionary Enterprise in Africa. The course taught how the missionaries came to evangelize the Nigerians, especially those living in western parts of Nigeria. I learned that the missionaries, primarily Irish missionaries, came to Nigeria after being ordained at 24 or 25 years old. I'm a priest here today because they passed the faith down there. America had a shortage of vocations, and since most of us could speak and understand English, we decided to help in the missions abroad. Some went to Germany or Italy, but I thought: 'Moses, you can speak English, you can either go to England, Australia or America.' So, I chose America. There were already a few seminarians at Christ the King Seminary and they said, 'Okay, let's talk to the Vocations Director, Father Walter Szczesny.' That's why I settled in Buffalo."

What is your family like?

"I'm one of seven children. I have four older sisters and two

younger brothers. So, I am number five. Unfortunately we lost one of my sisters to the cold hands of death in 2007. I'm from a very devout family. In my early life, my dad would jingle his bell at 5:30 am for morning prayer. Once my dad jingle the bell everybody had to come out. Reciting the family prayer has become part of me. All of my siblings are wonderful and accomplished in their own ways. My baby brother has a degree from the Nautical School of Science, and my immediate younger brother graduated as a civil engineer. My elder sisters are all married. One has a Master's degree, another has a business degree, and the third has a diploma in hair styling. I'm a family oriented person. I love family systems- our family system: the father, the mother, and the children. And as you know, the family that prays together, lives together happily. So the source of my joy and my happiness comes first from my family."

When did you know that you wanted to become a priest? Did someone inspire you to become a priest?

"I would say I was about nine or ten years old, after my First Holy Communion. I was serving Mass as an altar server, and I was drawn to the Sanctuary. From the age of three or four, my Dad would grab my hand and we would go to morning Mass. I was really inspired by the priests in my home parish back in Nigeria and gradually, the zeal to become a priest increased. It was first an attraction but gradually, I was drawn to the altar at the Sanctuary, and here we are! Yes, many of the priests back home inspired me. My pastor would take me to nursing homes and hospitals to visit the sick. The way he celebrated Mass and administered the Sacrament of the Sick to the people really endeared my heart and drew me closer to God. Also, parish seminarians would come home and tell us about the seminary. Once I finished high school, I had the intention of going to college to study mechanical engineering or medicine. At the same time, the desire to be a priest was burning deep in my heart as well. I applied to both the seminary and college, praying to God before the Blessed Sacrament that whichever admission came first I would accept. The admission to the seminary came first! I love the priesthood!"

How does life in the United States differ from life overseas in your opinion?

"My first culture shock was when I realized Americans look directly at a person's face when they are speaking to them. In Nigeria, you do not look into the eyes of your parents when they speak to you. Second was the weather. My first winter in 2013 wasn't that bizarre. However, the November 2014 snowstorm was crazy. My sister called from Nigeria after seeing the reports on CNN, and I let her know that I was okay. So after experiencing the snow-storm, I think I'm good to go! Also, my palate is changing now that I've been here for five years. I went home in 2017 and my Mom made one of my favorite meals, but it was too spicy for me! My Mom wanted to know what the Americans did to me! I've learned how to eat American food: pizza, pasta, tuna casserole and a lot of things. I think life in Buffalo is wonderful."



What activities do you like to participate in outside of the priesthood? What hobbies do you have?

"T'm very athletic. I used to play soccer very well until I broke my wrist and said: 'Moses, you need this wrist to lift the Precious Body and Blood of Christ,' so I switched to tennis. Father Paul plays good tennis. We played tennis at the seminary. Father Leon is trying to win me over to play racquetball, so maybe I will learn to play that. I also like to run so I go to Ellicott Creek Park for a jog. You've got to have quick feet!"

Brian Ruh joins the Parish Staff as Director of Evangelization

Father Leon has announced the appointment of Brian Ruh as St. Greg's new Director of Evangelization. "This is a significant step forward in our parish's mission to reach out to uninvolved Catholics and to deepen the faith life of the

people who are already attending regularly", he said. "Brian brings a rich blend of education and practical experience in ministry to this new position".

Brian is a 1986 graduate of East Aurora High School, and earned a B.A. degree in psychology from Geneseo in 1990. He began working at Baker Hall as a mental health specialist. "I loved working with teenage boys who needed special attention", Brian recalls. "It was a rewarding ministry".

In 1995, he became Youth Minister at St. Amelia Church in Tonawanda, working closely with Father Leon, who was Parochial Vicar there at that time. Brian was awarded a Master's degree in Pastoral Ministry, from Christ the King Seminary in 1997. From 2000 to 2004, he was the Campus Minister at St. Joseph's Collegiate Institute, then returned to St. Amelia's to take up the work of youth ministry again. Since 2006, he has been a Pastoral Associate at that parish, working in liturgy and adult education.

"I am thrilled to be joining the ministerial team at St. Greg's", he told *Spirit and Life.* "My goal is to build upon and advance the work of the parish Evangelization Committee".



Part of Brian's ministry will be to contact people who are registered in our parish, but who have not been active. Father Leon notes that about one-third of the registered people in any given parish fall into the category of "inactive". He has asked Brian "to reach out and meet these families or individuals one by one to discern why they no longer celebrate our faith, and invite them back".

Brian and his wife Patricia have four daughters. Emily and Eden attend Niagara University, and Monica and Katie are students at Mount Saint Mary Academy in Kenmore.

Volunteers Call on New Neighbors to Welcome Them

Volunteers from St. Greg's Evangelization Committee have begun calling on people who recently moved in our neighborhood. Three two-person teams are at work, often on Saturday mornings, visiting newcomers and presenting them with a "Welcome Wagon" kit. The kit contains a book and a CD on religious topics, copies of the parish bulletin and *Spirit and Life* and other "goodies".

Joe Dispenza and Shirley Mariathasan reported on their visits at a recent committee meeting. "Going door to door



finally has value and meaning", Joe said. "It is a joy to welcome newcomers to our neighborhood and our wonderful parish".

"It has been a wonderful experience to get out into the community and welcome new neighbors", Shirley pointed out. "People were warm, friendly, and appreciative.

About 20 parties move into our parish boundaries each month. Presently the teams are visiting people who moved in since March.

St. Greg's Students Raise \$7800 to Provide Water for African Village

Fifth graders at St. Gregory the Great School in Williamsville read Linda Sue Park's book, *A Long Walk to Water* (ISBN 978-0-547-57731). The book is fiction, but based on fact. Nya is a young girl living in a waterless village in South Sudan. She has to walk a long distance several times a day in order to get water for her family. Perseverance and working toward and attaining goals are the central themes. After reading the book, the students had a discussion with their teacher, Julie Rappold, about what they could do to help people like Nya, who lack ready access to water.

They became aware of an enterprise called "Water for South Sudan" that drills wells in that country. They learned they would need to raise \$7800 to pay for the well, and they decided to go for it. They used letter-writing skills learned in English class to craft personal letters to friends and family members, and business letters to companies, asking for their support. They developed and presented a power point presentation for parishioners. They organized a school-wide "Walk for Water" in which students did a one-mile trek while carrying water jugs, after soliciting sponsors.

It took a year and a half, but they crossed the finish line this past spring, and on May 24 got thrilling news from the well drillers:

"From our team in South Sudan, we are excited to inform you that the well you sponsored has been drilled. We hope you are as inspired by this as we are. Thank you for helping us provide clean water and countless opportunities for communities in South Sudan."

Miss Rappold beams with pride in her students. "Their amazing effort and hard work on this campaign helped achieve our goal, and made a difference for the people of South Sudan", she notes. St. Gregory School Principal Julie Gajewski agrees. "I am thrilled that our school is developing compassionate leaders who are disciples of Christ, not just in name, but in fact, by literally giving drink to the thirsty."



Disciple Camp Provides a Variety of Enriching Experiences

Enterprising young people took advantage of their summer vacation from school by taking part in "camps". There is Soccer camp for those who aspire to the next Lionel Messi, Football camp for those who hope one day to play in the NFL, and Hockey camp for Patrick Kane wannabes. These camps help boys and girls get better at their game.

St. Gregory's Disciple Camp aims at helping participants to become better at following Jesus. This summer some sixty young parishioners in grades five through eight took part in the camp for five days in July. The camp includes the full religion curriculum for each grade, as established by the diocese, but also lots of special and enriching experiences. Children learned about Eucharistic Adoration and had a chance to experience time in the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. They visited the parish Lourdes shrine, where they learned about St. Bernadette's apparitions and prayed the rosary. They ran a car wash to benefit the Doktor family, who will soon become missionaries in a foreign land. For their Outreach projects, Disciple Camp students collected \$423 for Catholic Charities and collected kid--friendly "meals in a can" for St. Vincent de Paul Society Food Pantry.

Many years ago Msgr. Wright began a giving program for our Parish children. He believed it was important to instill in our young parishioners, the future of our Faith, with the importance of giving to their parish and their community. Since its inception, each year every child in our School and Family Faith Formation program receive contributions envelopes with the intent that half of what is given in these envelopes would stay in our Parish and half would go to charities directly helping children. Every week a small stack of the children's envelopes are placed in the collection basket with their parents' contributions. The children's are counted and tallied separately.
